

We hope that all of you are safe, well and getting through the many obstacles before us lately. NOW, more than ever, is the time to lean in, dust yourselves off and get involved with your community. We all need people in our lives and other people need us.

Over the summer, we started the East Calgary Ambassador Program, in partnership with International Avenue BRZ and with funding from the federal government's Healthy Communities Initiative and the City of Calgary's, Community Safety Investment Framework Fund. The Ambassadors are walking the avenue, developing relationships with the people, businesses, and agencies in the area to help maintain vibrancy and help our most vulnerable gain access to resources. Our Social disorder task force helped lay the groundwork for this important program. Keep an eye out on International Avenue for the Purple people!

A walk or a drive around your neighbourhood should alert you to the fact we are in the midst of two different election campaigns. The Federal election is on September 20, 2021 where you will elect your Member of Parliament (MP).

On Monday, Oct. 18, you will elect School Trustees, Councillors and Mayor, along with a couple of plebiscite questions. We have forums set up for the Trustees, Ward 9 and 10 Councillors and Mayor (see page 8). Look at what your candidates are saying and please exercise your right to vote. A special thank you to the halls donating space for these forums.

WHAT IS 12 CSI ALL ABOUT?







12 COMMUNITY SAFETY INITIATIVE (12CSI)

Our Communication Team is working on our Fall edition of the 12 CSI Community Connector newsletter. Our 12 CSI practicum students are working thoughtfully and with enthusiasm to implement several new projects. They are very much appreciated as we have limited staff.

We have set up election forums prior to City of Calgary Municipal Elections (October 18). These forums are all on Wednesdays. On September 15 -Trustees candidates forum, on September 22nd - Ward 9 candidates forum, on September 29th - Ward 10 candidates forum and on October 6 - Mayor candidates forum. TASK FORCE ON SOCIAL DISORDER

The East Calgary Ambassador program is up and running. The goal is to recognize, address and alleviate some of the concerns along 17th Avenue SE. Keep an eye out for special events, especially on Saturdays. The move of Salvation Army to the old Zeller/Target site is going smoothly. However, the move of Victory Church to the former T&C site is still very much in the planning phase. We have been advocating for more public consultation.

EAST CALGARY TWIN ARENA SOCIETY (ECTAS)

ECTAS is now in full operation. They are still looking for some Board members. This is a community operated facility so your help would be much appreciated.

COMMUNITY SAFETY - Back to School Traffic Safety

Hello! My name is Sgt. Kevin Collier and I am the new CRO (Community Resource Officer) for the Calgary Police Service District 4.

I have been in District 4 for the majority of my 14 years in policing and believe that it is a great and resilient community. It is a pleasure to serve the citizens of Calgary and the citizens of the communities that comprise District 4.

Back to School Traffic Safety

With Fall on the way students will be going back to school. The safety of students and drivers is a priority for the Calgary Police Service. We are hoping everyone can assist making schools as safe as possible for everyone.

School start and end times often make roads very congested. To keep our children safe its important everyone obeys the law as defined in Alberta's Traffic Safety Act. Here is a list commonly observed traffic violations and the monetary fines that maybe imposed.

Illegal U-turn (\$162) - U-turns are illegal between intersections, alley junctions, when prohibited by sign, at traffic signals and when unsafe. The only place to legally do a U-turn is at an intersection not controlled by lights if it can be done safely and there is no sign indicating that you can't.

Pedestrian J-walk (\$81) - If there is a marked crosswalk

on the block, you must use it to cross. Help to teach your children the proper way to cross the street and lead by example.

Seatbelts (\$162) - It is an offense to operate a vehicle without wearing a seatbelt or to have children not wearing a seatbelt. Please ensure your child seats are properly secured.

Impede/block traffic (double parking) (\$81) - Double parking is stopping alongside another vehicle in the middle of a street to drop off your child. This adds to congestion because you are backing up traffic behind you while you let your child out of the vehicle. This also puts your child in a dangerous position as they will be walking between two cars parked after being let out. These vehicles are not expecting little ones to walk behind them and may back up into your child.

Distracted driving (use handheld cell phone, etc.) (\$300) Disobey posted signs (includes no stopping zones) (\$243) Stopping or parking in a bus zone (\$75)


Speeding- \$110 for 10km/h over limit, \$175 for 20 km/h over limit, \$249 for 30 km/h over limit

Fail to yield for pedestrian in crosswalk (\$810)

The big question is — Are you doing your part to contribute to the Power of Community?








Volunteers EVERYWHERE! by Larry Leach

In my community, and many others, everywhere you turn there are volunteers. Whether it be at the community associations or in one of the many schools and sports organizations, there is an army of volunteers. Yet when I attend a meeting, or read a community newsletter the phrase "It's always the same people volunteering" strikes at almost every turn. So lets have some thoughtful analysis on why volunteers seem to feel unappreciated and as if no one wants to help us.

In reality there are hundreds of people who make up the fabric of any community and contribute in a positive way.

If you are a parent, think about your child's school. There is the parent council, the school play, the fundraisers (both organizing and selling) and all the classroom and special day volunteer parents. They do everything from input the thoughts of the parents to the administration to hand out hot chocolate to the kids at a winter carnival. They sell cookie dough and make sure our kids are safe on field trips and feed them at the fun lunch. And that is just at the school.

There is also the community association itself where there are many groups within the main body. In my community we have our executive board, there's a pre-school, Boys scouts and Cubs, Girl Guides and Sparks, the 50-plus club and entertainment events like a kids Christmas party. We also have a traffic committee, Air traffic noise committee, Block Watch, bingo chair, casino chair, publicity (getting out in the cold to change the signs), maintenance of the community hall, making and maintaining of the outdoor ice rink. Each of these groups has an army of volunteers of it's own, that may not attend meetings or get the praise they deserve.



Then there are minor sports organizations and clubs, from soccer, baseball, basketball and lacrosse, to gymnastics and martial arts, and the board members, coaches, managers and fundraisers who make all these things a possibility. Tournament organizers, field marshalls, medal presenters, and the list goes on and on. This is just within each community.

How about the city as a whole, from homeless shelters and other charity organizations, high school, college and university sports, the list goes on and on.



Yet still I hear time and time again, "but no one wants to volunteer". Sometimes from my own mouth! Frustration and impatience can be contagious, but so can patience and determination.

So back to the question, why do we as volunteers seem to feel as though we are unappreciated and no one wants to help us? Communication - plain and simple. Technology has made it easier for us to communicate with one another and yet the challenges of effective communication is still the number one barrier between a successful and near-death volunteer organization.

All volunteer oriented groups will tell you that recruiting and keeping volunteers is the number one concern yet many of these same organizations don't even have a volunteer coordinator to help develop and communicate with it's volunteers.

So where do we go from here? The organization itself must put forth more effort to communicate with those who don't attend the meetings. First, recruiting an effective volunteer coordinator and then communicating the needs of the organization with that person who then can then get the word out to the group.

Anyone who wishes to volunteer also has the responsibility to communicate. If you can't make it out to the meetings, send an e-mail or call a person on the Board, hopefully a volunteer coordinator, and let them know what you can do to help. Many requests, e-mails and calls for help go unanswered because people have no idea of exactly what help is needed. Rather than ask, they just don't respond.

Last, but far from least, if you are a volunteer who feels unappreciated, pat another volunteer on the back and tell them they are doing a great job and how important they are to the success of the organization. If you get a pat on the back, "pay it forward" and you will get it back again and again. Now lets get out there and make it happen!

We aim to create impact on three key levels:





COMMUNITY SAFETY - Home and Garage

Garages are favorites targets for thieves

As summer ends and Fall starts, Calgarians barely have a chance to find the snow shovel in the garage before the first winter storm hits the city. In the few weeks of warm fall weather, we usually find ourselves doing some yard work in preparation for the winter months.

We open the garage and grab a rake then head to the yard. We discover the poplar trees have dropped their leaves and will keep us busy all afternoon. What we may not know is that we have also left ourselves vulnerable to a home break-in.

Home break-ins were identified as the top policing priority in the Calgary Police Service's 2000 community survey.

Calgary Police Service emphasizes the importance of taking precautions to prevent crime in your community.

Open or unlocked garage doors are a common contributing factor in house break-ins. An open garage allows criminals to "window shop" for items worth stealing and provides access to your home. Leaving the garage door open is a common and costly mistake. Keep your family safe and your home secure - ock your doors, including your garage door, whether you are home, away from home, or in the yard.

Other crime prevention ideas include:

Doors and locks:

• Outside doors and frames should be made of solid wood or

steel, which are harder to force open than hollow-core doors. Frames should fit snugly (within ½ inch) against the door.

- Secure all outside doors with deadbolt locks.
- Ensure the lock's throw (or bolt) extends at least one inch past the edge of the door when locked.
- The strike plate is the flat metal piece on the door frame that receives the lock's throw, or bolt. Attach a six- or eight-inch strike plate with screws long enough (about three inches) to pass through the door frame and into the wall stud.


When home during the day, report the following to the Calgary Police Service at 266-1234:

- Vehicles moving slowly/randomly through neighbourhood.
- A stranger running/walking through neighbourhood.
- A stranger looking into homes or parked cars.


What to do about prowlers or break-ins:


- If you see a prowler outside your home, call the police at once at 9-1-1.
- If someone enters your house while you're there, call 9-1-1.
- If you arrive home to find someone has broken in, call the police at 266-1234 from another location before entering the house. If you believe someone is still inside, call 9-1-1.

BYLAW REMINDERS - Vehicles and Property

Addressing

Community Standards Bylaw 5M2004

Owners/residents are responsible for ensuring that addresses on the front of their property are clearly visible from the roadway. To assist emergency services and other City operations, addresses must also be clearly displayed at the back of properties that are adjacent to alleys or public walkways.

Untidy properties

Community Standards Bylaw 5M2004

Owners/residents are responsible for ensuring their properties remain tidy. As a result, the storage of any materials on a residential lot must not be visible from outside the property.

This includes loose garbage, yard waste, bottles, cans, household furniture, packaging materials, machinery, equipment or automobile parts and appliances. In addition, when stored outside, refrigerators and freezers must be locked or have the doors removed.

An accumulation of building materials may only be stored on a property if the owner can establish that construction or renovation is occurring or imminent. Owners are responsible for ensuring these materials are stacked in an orderly manner.

Materials that are prohibited on private property include:

- Any accumulation of offensive material such as animal remains, animal feces and materials that create unpleasant odours or are likely to attract pests.
- Open or exposed storage of industrial fluid such as engine oil, brake fluid, antifreeze or other hazardous materials.
- Dilapidated vehicles.

Structure maintenance

Community Standards Bylaw 5M2004

Owners/residents are responsible for ensuring that structures on their property remain in good repair. These include:

- Fences
- Foundation walls, exterior walls, roofs, windows, doors.
- Protective or decorative finishes of exterior structures.
- Exterior stairs, landings, porches, balconies and decks.

Vehicle parking

Calgary Traffic Bylaw 26M96

Owners/residents are responsible for ensuring that vehicles parked on their property and adjacent streets are registered, insured, operable and properly equipped. Owners/residents should ensure the following rules are met.

- Parked vehicles do not block access to driveways, waste containers, fire hydrants or streets.
- Any service work or minor repairs to vehicles occur only on private property unless emergency repairs are required to move the vehicle off the street.

- Unless allowed by specific markings or signs, always park with the vehicle's right side parallel to the curb or edge of the roadway.
- Some community streets may be designated and signed as a Snow Control Route. When a snow event is declared, all vehicles must be removed from those streets to allow for snow plows and equipment to do their work. Vehicles that are not moved may be ticketed and towed. Call 311 or visit calgary.ca/snow to find if a snow event is currently in place.
- In communities where parking is restricted to residents, owners/residents require a permit to park on the street adjacent to their property

Recreation vehicles

- Recreational vehicles or RVs (e.g. motor homes, campers, travel and tent trailers) can be parked on the street adjacent to the owner's or driver's residence for no more than 36 consecutive hours. After this point, the RV must be moved to an off-street location for at least 48 consecutive hours before it may be parked back on the street.
- RVs and utility trailers must not remain parked in an actual front setback area of a driveway for longer than 24 hours, as per Land Use Bylaw 1P2007. An actual front setback area typically ranges from \pm 3 to \pm 6 metres and is located between the front property line and the house.
- RVs may be parked to the side or rear of houses. For assistance call the Planning Services Centre at 403-268-5311.
- RVs may be stored in some industrial and special districts where Vehicle Storage Recreational is a listed use.

Land Use Bylaw 1P2007, calgary.ca/landusebylaw

• Trailers or detachable camping vehicles should not be left on the street or in an alley if not connected to a vehicle.

Snow and ice

Street Bylaw 20M88

Owners/residents are responsible for the complete removal of snow and ice, to the bare pavement, from all private and public sidewalks and driveways within 24 hours of a snow fall.

Snow or ice removed from a public sidewalk may be placed on the road or boulevard, provided that its placement does not create an obstruction. All snow and ice removed from private sidewalks must be placed within the property. As a best practice, shovelled snow and ice should not be stored in such a way that melting water will drain into your neighbour's property.

Applying a sand de-icing mixture may help remove ice from sidewalks. Free sand is available to owners/residents, with their own containers, at many Calgary Fire Department stations and Calgary Roads depots throughout the city.

Sidewalks and streets must also be kept clear of electrical cords used to plug in vehicles.


