We will also be making a Mental Health film and some of our videos will be translated into "Stoney Nakoda" language in the coming months.

It's more important than ever to look out for one another. "Volunteering is the ultimate exercise in democracy. You vote in elections once a year, but when you volunteer, you vote every day about the kind of community you want to live in."

THE FACES OF OUR COMMUNITIES

The 12 communities in our 12 CSI area are 90,000 people strong and we are also very culturally diverse! Our so-called 'visible minorities' make up 35.6% of our population - the same as the City as a whole.

There are quite a few languages spoken along with many, many dialects. In 91% of our homes, English is understood. And 85% are now Canadian citizens.

The top six languages spoken are:

- English
- Filipino (Tagalog)
- Vietnamese Arabic
- Spanish
- Cantonese

Given the fact that we live in a finite world that continues to becomes 'closer and closer' the value of having a variety of languages is a definite plus for jobs, cooperation and understanding in the future. The present generation already works around the world.

Our 12 CSI area provides many opportunities to enjoy our diversity. The International Avenue Business Revitalization initiative offers a yearly program called "Around the world in 35 blocks". But you don't have to wait – just head out and try all the delicious and interesting food from many countries. Also, take a closer look at the great murals along International Avenue (17th Ave SE).

My family has been part of this global community since 1974. We're surrounded by friends from Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Pakistan, India, Vietnam, China and the Phillipines.



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Marlborough Park Residents,

Spring is inching its way forward and before you know it the children will be taking a break from their schooling. This means that they will likely be crossing our streets more often and could be dashing out onto the street from between parked cars. So as usual I urge you to be cautious as you drive through the neighborhood, we have already lost way too many lives due to the pandemic.

Most of you know the speed limit on most residential streets will be going down to 40 Km/hour effective May 31. This is intended to save lives in the event of a collision between a vehicle and a pedestrian. Madigan Drive, and 8th Ave NE will remain at 50Km/hr as well as 4th Ave between Madigan Dr. and 52nd Street where it isn't a School/pedestrian Zone.

The City of Calgary Parks Dept. has partnered up with the Disc Golf Association and installed a temporary 12 hole disc golf course on the north end of the park. This sporting activity has grown rapidly over the last 18 months and may prove to be a good addition to our community. I will caution the users of this course to be respectful of the people walking their dogs or just walking along the pathway because we have already had one too many injuries from a golf disc.

I have had the pleasure of acting as your President for the last two years. On June 23 we will be hosting our Annual General Meeting. Our intent is to host an in-person meeting but due to concerns around Covid-19 we will provide an on line Zoom option as well.

Several positions will be open including my position and I am hoping that we can get some new people at the table as the Community Association is in dire need of new board members. Please consider contributing some of your time to this rewarding community activity.

SUMMER MESSAGE from EWCA BOARD

Hello! I hope everyone is managing through the latest covid-19 restrictions, whatever they happen to be when you are reading this, and are hopeful, as I am, that we will soon pass the tipping point, when the vaccines do their thing and help bend that curve one last time downwards.

I know the EWCA board is eagerly waiting for the day when we can again open the community hall to rentals and our Community Events team is again allowed to start planning in-person community events again!

Woo-Hoo! This coming August marks EWCA's 40th anniversary and it would be wonderful to be able to have an outdoor celebration, but sadly, it is too soon to be able to plan anything yet.

By the time this is published, your EWCA will have held its Annual General Meeting (AGM) on May 10th. All executive positions except for president were up for grabs, as well as all the non-executive positions. Quite a few current board members are putting their names back in the hat, and we have had a few community members come to us with the intention of putting their names forward at the AGM. We are really excited to see some new faces wanting to join the team, and are looking forward to working with them.

I also wish to thank this current board for their service to their community during this shortened term, which was due to covid-19 restrictions that pushed the last AGM back to September 2020 from May 2020.

EWCA has been working for a number of years to get a community garden going at the community hall, and it seems that this year there might finally be enough people interested in the designing, organizing, creation, and development of a garden to get the planning underway.





There are a number of hurdles the committee will need to clear, in order to satisfy the City and the EWCA board that their plan is viable and sustainable over the years to come, prior to the final approval being given for the actual construction of the garden to start.

Several years ago, the City's Parks Department looked around Erin Woods to find a suitable location for a community garden. In the end, the Parks Department decided that the best location they could recommend was at the EWCA hall. Two years ago, an environmental assessment was conducted at this hall location, with the results coming back that the site was okay to be used for a raised bed garden, with some fruit trees too, perhaps.

However, the garden committee has now decided to see if there are any different sites for the garden that would also be suitable. One such possibility they've asked Parks about is building the garden on the SE leg of Erin Woods Park. You may remember, this part of the park is where EWCA is already working with Parks with the goal of creating an official offleash dog park there.

We will keep you posted on what happens next, as the EWCA board may need to vote on which location better serves the community for the garden, depending on what Parks decides. Or it may come down to having the community help

the Board decide. Either way, with this delay, it's likely too late to get things growing this year, but we are hopeful that there will be a community garden happening by next spring 2022!


We are fortunate to have partnered with several area social agencies, community associations (CAs), and public support groups. With their help we can publish this newsletter and together we are 'getting the message out".

12 COMMUNITY SAFETY INITIATIVE (12CSI)

At this time, your 12 CSI Communication Committee is working on the 2021 summer edition of our newsletter, the 12 CSI *Community Connector*. We are welcoming nine new practicum students to help organize and implement several different projects. They are very much appreciated as we have limited staff. 
Fresh Routes Mobile Grocery Store is no longer available as funding became an issue.

COMMUNITY SAFETY - The Importance of reporting crime to the Police

This topic has come up many times while speaking with residents in all of the community meetings I have attended. I often hear, "why bother to call the police, they can't or will not do anything anyways", "it takes too long to get through on the police non-emergency line and the bad guy is already gone by the time they get here".

These comments are not uncommon when I speak with community residents who are frustrated by the lack of immediate response to the suspicious or criminal activity they have just witnessed. **One of the most important actions a resident can do is report crime and disorder**, even if it is petty in nature. When suspicious activity and crime are not reported, it is given an opportunity to increase and possibly become more severe if not dealt with.

It is vital that these incidents are reported for the Calgary Police Service (CPS) and the Community. **CPS analysts use the reports to find patterns, links and crime trends for the area.** The analysts put together maps, and bulletins with suspects for crimes in the areas. This information is shared with front line officers who then are able to prioritize areas of concern.

Often individuals who commit these crimes are known to CPS and are identified and arrested. This final result is

not often seen by the person who first made the report and they may never be notified of arrests or charges.

In your District 4 Calgary Police Service, the Inspector, Staff Sergeant, Sergeants, Analyst and Community Resource Officers, meet monthly to review and discuss emerging crime and disorder trends that are affecting communities in District 4.


These meetings help to develop strategies that drive investigations and prioritize patrols to solve the issues within our communities. Sometimes when trends are identified early proactive policing can lead to disruption or elimination of activities in the area.

The key to all of this, is the initial step of first reporting of the suspicious activity or crime. Without this first crucial step, the crime will go unnoticed and cannot be addressed by CPS. If CPS does not know about it through reports we cannot attend or address it. Please assist CPS in identifying, preventing and solve crimes in your community take the time to report incidents no matter how small.

BYLAW REMINDERS - Summer fun, summer safe!

Fire pits

Community Standards Bylaw 5M2004

Owners/residents are responsible for the appropriate use of fire pits on their properties. Fire pits must:

- Be constructed from non-combustible material (e.g. brick or stone), set upon or built into the bare ground or placed on non-combustible material.
- Be situated at least two metres from any building, fence or wooden structure.
- Be covered with a mesh screen or spark guard to reduce the spread of embers and sparks from wood-burning fire pits.
- Be located away from trees or branches.
- Burn only clean, dry firewood (materials that are strictly prohibited in fire pits include painted/treated lumber, yard waste, tires, plastics and animal parts).
- Ensure open flames do not exceed one metre in height and width to ensure that fire embers, sparks or dense smoke do not endanger anyone or cause a nuisance to neighbouring properties.
- Be attended to at all times, with a means to extinguish the fire on hand at all times.

Fire pit use on residential properties may occur:

- Between 10 a.m. and midnight, Monday to Friday.
- Between 10 a.m. and 1 a.m. Saturday and Sunday.

Owners/residents must also comply with fire bans that can be declared by the Fire Chief at any time as required.



Garage sales

Temporary Signs on Highways Bylaw 29M97

Owners/residents must comply with bylaws when using temporary signs for personal sales. These temporary signs must not be placed:

- Within 15 metres (49 feet) of an intersection.
- On a traffic sign.
- In playground and school zones.
- On roadways identified on the Prohibited Roads list.

All temporary signs must also include the sign owner's name, address, phone number and the posting date. The signs must be removed within 24 hours following the garage sale. Owners/residents with specific questions on the use of temporary signs can call 311 or visit calgary.ca.

Grass and weeds

Community Standards Bylaw 5M2004

Owners of both developed properties and vacant lots are responsible for ensuring that grass and weeds are maintained to not exceed 15 cm (6 inches). Owners are encouraged to keep their grass at 7.5 cm long (3 inches). Longer grass shades its roots from the sun and chokes out weeds. Longer grass also helps create a healthier, hardier lawn by allowing longer roots to develop and it holds moisture better. Owners must be compliant with the Alberta Weed Control Act. If an owner has weeds listed as Prohibited Noxious, they must be destroyed. Weeds listed as Noxious must be controlled. Please refer to the Act for more information.

Yard watering - Water Utility Bylaw 40M2006

Lawns should not be watered if it is going to rain that week. During dry periods, it is recommended to water "slow and low" so it can sink into the soil and not run off the grass and other plantings. Watering between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. should be avoided, as this tends to be the hottest time of the day. The City also encourages native plants to both decrease water demand and to support biodiversity in the city. Native plants also tend to require less maintenance.

For more information on native plants consult The City of Calgary's YardSmart program or the Alberta Native Plant Council.

Pesticide use

Pesticides are regulated by the federal and provincial governments and are often used to prevent, control, or destroy pests when other methods fail. Although pesticides are strictly regulated in Canada, they can be hazardous if not used carefully. Like many other chemical products, pesticides are toxic and can cause injury, like burns and poisoning. To use pesticides safely, the label directions must be followed. When buying a pesticide, always look for a Pest Control Products number on the label. This way you know the product has been tested and approved by Health Canada.

Noise

Community Standards Bylaw 5M2004

Sound restrictions exist to address appropriate noise levels during the daytime and at night. Owners/residents are responsible for ensuring that activities on their properties fall within the appropriate sound restrictions and do not disturb others on adjacent properties.

The operation of power tools (lawn mowers, motorized garden tools, snow clearing and leaf blowing devices) and the use of skateboard and sports ramps in residential areas may only occur:

- Between 7 a.m. and 10 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays.
- Between 9 a.m. and 10 p.m. Sundays/statutory holidays.
